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## Spring Has Sprung!

Although winter is definitely behind us, it feels as if the snowball of work has reached maximum acceleration and is careening downhill into the spring season. It is so easy to become distracted by the warmth outside, dreaming about what fun summer will bring, or even thinking about new schools next September but we first have to get through the spring. Sixth grade at GCCS is demanding, especially during the month of May.

We have been sharing updates on portfolio in the newsletter and through weekly reflections, but we want to underscore the importance of successful completion of all of the prompts going into scoring day on May 31<sup>st</sup>. We have set interim deadlines for drafts so we can provide our young authors with timely feedback – but if drafts are not submitted or if feedback is not taken, then students have to own the logical consequences of their efforts. To be clear, students have 25 minutes every morning to work on assignments during study hall and we devote time weekly to critique and revision, usually Fridays. The written reflections are meant to be independent. These are assessments of your child’s ability to use the writing process, manage time and resources, and reflect on their learning at GCCS. Naturally, each student is different and may require a bit more scaffolding, but the idea is to develop the capacity to grapple, put forth best effort, and revel in the earned success. Successful completion of both the written and oral presentation are the prerequisites for participation in our Passage Dinner on June 20<sup>th</sup> and we truly want every student and his/ her family to participate.

In addition to portfolio, our final product for our year of play needs to be completed and our first deadline is rapidly approaching. Members of the Spindler Family Foundation will be visiting with us May 8<sup>th</sup> to learn how their investment in the Cumming Nature Center playspace will be used. Our class will be working hard next week to prepare a brief presentation for our guests and then move forward with the formal site plans and documentation to be shared at our final exhibition night. As you can see, we have lots to do and no time to waste. May is a long month, but every shred of time is already spoken for. Check in periodically with your sixth grader about progress in portfolio and what supports might be needed to get through the last eight weeks of school!

## Prepping for Passage



In addition to all of the academic demands of spring in sixth grade, students are already getting ready for Passage. In music they have begun practicing the music for the end of year ceremonies and soon dancers will begin working with Mrs. Johnson to choreograph movement to accompany the class song, “Wavin’ Flag.” Mrs. Schmitz has an ambitious arrangement for this piece of music and it is already beginning to come together and sounds amazing. In the visual arts, student are starting their art folios, mini-documentation panels that chronicle their work with Ms. Lockner. These will be used as part of the portfolio presentation. The arts are an important part of learning at GCCS and we can’t wait for you to see how it culminates at the end of the year.
