### Put to the Test

The mad frenzy of Fourth Grade testing is upon us. In many classrooms across the state, students and teachers have spent months neglecting their regular curriculum and have devoted long and tedious hours to drill and practice test preparation. They have eliminated what they consider to be "extra" experiences like fieldwork, hands-on projects, and performances to make way for more rote test training. They have held afterhours test preparation sessions. They have created "motivational" posters and held pep rallies to spur children on to peak performance. They have justified every instructional decision with "because it's on the test."

But not at GCCS. Instead, throughout the curriculum, our experienced Fourth Grade teachers have woven assignments that mirror the format and expectations of the exam. They have prepared children to do well on the reading and writing test by having them *read* and *write* extensively. The class undertook a "miniexpedition" in which children posed questions about the test, then investigated the style of the test, the manner in which it will be administered, the content and skills that will be addressed, and the way it will be scored. Their regular curriculum has continued throughout the fall and winter, with thoughtful instruction and additional tutoring geared toward helping children become skilled and literate, rather than simply good test-takers. More than a few parents expressed their relief and appreciation for this approach.

We don't know what the results of the testing will be for our students. We are a new school, and this is our first group of fourth graders that will encounter the state exams. We were encouraged by the results of the Third Grade Test of New York State Standards that we administered to this class last spring. The class showed marked progress from Fall, 2001, and looked to be on track to perform well on this year's exams. We believe that the test will yield information that will be useful to us, and we will use the results to inform our instructional decisions. This must be the function of *every* assessment – to improve student learning.

We know that there are a multitude of important outcomes that can never be assessed by a standardized test. These outcomes, such as character development, collaborative skills, research skills, and a thirst for learning, are some of the fundamentals of a good elementary education that we refuse to sacrifice. We don't think the New York State ELA is a bad test. But we do think that bad things are done to prepare children for the test and to share the results. A single test is not an adequate measure of a school's success, a child's



learning, or a teacher's performance. GCCS's approach to evaluation encompasses a broader view and a wider range of ongoing behaviors.

Regardless of the test scores for our students, we will continue to help each child move forward, and we will strive to continuously improve our program and instruction. There are no shortcuts to a good education, and we will persist in providing a well-rounded, rich learning experience for children.

### What did you do in school today?

"Oh, nothing." If you had a nickel for every time you heard that! Regardless of the level of challenge, the amount of stimulation, and the variety of tasks your child experiences each day, if yours is a typical child, you're bound to receive this non-answer on a regular basis.

Be assured that there is NEVER a day at GCCS during which your child does nothing. From the time they enter in the morning until they leave at dismissal, children are reading, playing, discussing, building, planning, experimenting, singing, and so on – both in the classroom and out. Unfocused moments and time-filling activities are rare indeed. Every endeavor is characterized by a sense of purpose, responsibility for learning, and drive for quality. GCCS staff continually helps children make connections between daily tasks and the long-term projects or skills children are working toward.

Perhaps trying specific questions will help open the floodgates of information for you:

- Who did you play with today? What did you play?
- Did you build anything? What materials did you use?
- Who read to you today? What did he/she read?
- What did you do on your expedition project?
- Did you have a field study? A guest speaker? What was it about?
- What did you do in music/art/P.E.?
- What did you read? What did you write in your journal?
- What did you sing?
- What was challenging today? funny? surprising? exciting? noisy? peaceful?

One parent suggest having a high-low conversation at dinner. Each family member reports the high and low point of his/her day, which leads to interesting follow-up discussion.

Parent interest and involvement in school is a key to children's success. Regardless of the answer, keep asking! And be sure to schedule a visit to your child's classroom if you'd like to experience first-hand the active, learning-filled day we provide.

## Family Association upcoming meeting

The Legislative Issues Committee would like all parents to be aware of the latest development on the political front. On January 29<sup>th</sup> Governor Pataki unveiled his proposed 2003-2004 Executive Budget, which contains six million dollars in funding for the Charter Schools Stimulus Fund. This is good news for Charter Schools and a victory for all of us. However, we are anticipating great pressure from the Legislature to eliminate this funding. The Legislature has made repeated attempts to put an end to charter schools in previous years and this year will be no exception, especially since overall school aid is proposed to be reduced this year.

In an effort to inform our GCCS families about political issues surrounding charter schools, the Legislative committee has invited Bill Phillips, who is the president of the New York Charter Schools Association (NYCSA), to speak at our next February 26<sup>th</sup> Family Association Meeting. NYSCA provides management and technical assistance to charter schools, monitors legislative and regulatory activity that affects charter schools, and educates the public about charter schools. Bill will bring us up to date about the political climate in Albany, and how we can support school choices for our children and the children of our community.
