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# **OCTOBER SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS**

This month was filled with science experiments, the 4th and 5th grade performance of the Kuku, Curriculum Night, school photos, field studies and of course, lots of learning.


3rd grade students explored the Erie Canal lock system with their field study on the Sam Patch. With their studying of the Erie Canal, they learned about Sam Patch and why the canal has locks.



4th graders have entered the world of fractions in math. They are learning how to identify the proper fraction given a diagram, and how to use a number line to model fractions. While fractions can be daunting, our students are persevering!

6th graders had a field study to the Memorial Art Gallery where they learned about artifacts. This field study connects to students' case study where they are investigating artifacts from history that show how humans resolved conflicts and found peace.

Kindergarteners are learning their letters, sounds, vowels and consonants. They are also focused on developing their number sense to achieve fluency in counting from 1 to 10 and comparing groups of up to 10. Students represent quantities by writing the correct number.



# **CHARACTER FOCUS**

October's character focus was <u>RESPONSIBILITY</u>. Students discussed what it means to be responsible at home, at school and in the community. Through our Crew structure, students are making connections throughout the day about their demonstration of the different habits of character.

For the month of November, the character focus is **INITIATIVE**. Please have conversations with your child(ren) at home about how they can take initiative.

At our school, we explore seven habits of character: *responsibility, initiative, compassion, courage, gratitude, perseverance and collaboration.* Monthly, we will have a focus on one specific habit of character where we discuss how we model that habit and also set goals. Not only do we want our students to gain academic skills, we want them to reflect on themselves as ethical people and to identify how they can



be agents of change in their life, community and the world.



# **Vocabulary Development**

Vocabulary is an important part of helping students improve their comprehension skills. Studies show that kids with a strong vocabulary also become better at speaking and writing. To support your child's vocabulary growth at home, here are some fun and engaging strategies for the whole family:

- 1. **Word of the Day**: Start a "Word of the Day" tradition at home. Choose a new word each day, discuss its meaning, and use it in sentences. Encourage your child to come up with their own sentences or draw pictures.
- Reading Together: Spend time reading books together. Choose a variety of genres and pause to discuss unfamiliar words. Encourage your child to ask questions about the text, which can lead to discovering new vocabulary in context.
- 3. **Incorporate Words into Daily Life**: Use new vocabulary in everyday conversations. For example, if your child learns the word "enormous," encourage them to describe an object around the house using that word.
- 4. **Encourage Writing**: Motivate your child to write stories or journal entries using their newly learned vocabulary. Tap into their creativity and have them write about an adventure or create a character.
- 5. **Visit the Library**: Make regular trips to the library to explore new books together. Let your child choose topics that interest them, and help them find books that introduce new vocabulary.
- Connect with Technology: Utilize educational apps and websites.
   Choose one thing to do and share with classroom teachers using Seesaw with the hashtag # GeneseeReads.


## Claim, Evidence and Reason

Supporting all students to be authentic communicators is part of our school's mission ARCS, and one instructional initiative the school is implementing is Claim, Evidence and Reason.The Claim, Evidence, Reasoning (CER) strategy is a structured approach used to encourage critical thinking and effective communication of ideas, especially in writing. The purpose of this strategy is to help students develop their skill of communicating through writing and speaking across all content areas.

Here's a breakdown of each component:

- 1. **Claim**: This is a statement or assertion that answers a question or addresses a topic. It should be clear and specific.
  - *Example*: "Exercising regularly helps improve focus in school."
- Evidence: This consists of data, facts, or examples that support the claim. Evidence can come from research studies, expert opinions, or personal experiences.
  - *Example*: "A study found that students who exercise for at least 30 minutes a day perform better on tests and pay more attention in class."
- 3. **Reasoning**: This explains how the evidence supports the claim. It connects the dots between the claim and the evidence, showing why the evidence is relevant.
  - *Example*: "This shows that when students exercise, their brains get more oxygen and become more alert, which helps them concentrate better on their schoolwork."

During professional learning, teachers will be engaged in the explicit instruction of writing using the CER strategy and the Writing Revolution. This will support students' ability to construct more persuasive arguments, strengthen their analytical skills, and create high-quality products.
