Director's Message

Dear Flour City Families,

We've had a strong start to GCCS-Flour City's 3rd year! We are almost done with our first fall expedition cycle, and are looking forward to sharing our learning with you on each grade level Exhibition Night!

I thought I'd share about what we've been doing "behind the scenes" during our Staff Professional Development times! This school year we have committed to improving our science and math instruction, so a lot of our time has been spent focusing on improving our teaching within those subjects. Teachers have been working with the Instructional Leadership Team and our EL coach to learn our NY State Science Learning Standards, how they connect to the GCCS Curriculum Framework, and how to plan for engaging and meaningful science lessons. We have been using the 5E model as a framework for planning, and this has proven to be engaging for teachers and students alike!

The staff has been diving into work around mathematics instruction as well. On our full staff development day in October, we worked with an EL coach to learn about the progressions of understanding that students exhibit in their work. We looked at student responses to story problems and worked together to determine what concepts students are grasping and which ones they still need to work toward. Then, on Election Day, the staff learned about the important mathematical relationships that students need to understand in order to build strong number sense. This is always a good thing to focus on because most adults did not get math instruction in a way that promotes number sense when we were in school. Math instruction in the past leaned more towards teaching students processes to help compute numbers instead of focusing on concept development and building number sense. So, this oftentimes requires a shift in adult thinking about how we solve mathematical problems.

While students are on their Thanksgiving break, the instructional staff will be hard at work planning for our Winter Expedition where we focus on the "City Grows" time period in Rochester (Post Civil War-Pre-space exploration 1865-1960). We also do this with the staff at the River Campus so teachers can collaborate on how to best teach the specific grade level concepts and content.

As you can see, our staff has a lot going on behind the scenes! And it's only November!
